All records come from our Conch Historian Mr. Glynn Archer Jr. who compiled them from the 1940's to 24 games in 1996, Coach Wise finished the 96 season and found the 97 Stats from the Library. Our Voice of the Conchs, and Mr. Marconi winner Rick Lopez has kept the records from 1998 till the present. Coach Judd A. Wise has gone back through both Archer/Lopez files, plus the citizen and microfilm from our great library, info from Charles Randale, max preps, the library of congress, and with the help from former Conch players Chris Valdez, and Jack Niles, this is what I came up with to help the fans of Key West see who the leaders are. These are the official/unofficial records from 1944 to present. We are beginning season 81. In 2020, the season was shortened due to the Coronavirus. VICTOR ALBURY MAKES THE SAN DIEGO PADRES FARM TEAM AS A FREE LANCE PLAYER. THE TEAM PLAYS IN HIS HOMETOWN, KEY WEST. SUMMER OF 1969. IN THE WINTER OF 1970 HE IS DRAFTED BY THE MINNESOTA TWINS.

1972, The Conchs played a two game set against Miami Southwest. The conchs were known as the hitless wonders. That weekend the Southwest pitcher and Key West's Paul Hammond threw a no-hitter against each other and the Conchs won 1-0. The next day, the Southwest pitcher threw another no-hitter against Key West, and the Conchs pitcher Brooks Carey threw a one hitter. Key West wins 1-0. Three no hitters and a one hitter. These games appeared in the Sports Illustrated magazine BELIEVE IT OR NOT.

1973, John I. Leonard throws a No-Hitter against the conchs, but Key West manages to score one run and wins the game 1-0.

1976, The Charlotte Tarpons came to Key West for a two game series on March 18 & 19. Larry Davila was on the mound Friday and Mark Ingraham was on the hill Saturday. Both conch pitchers threw No-Hitters and the score of each game was 17-0. The following Friday Larry Davila throws another No-Hitter for three in a row for Key West and Back to Back No-Hitters for Larry Davila.

HISTORY:

1940'S:

There were teams in the 40'S, but information is sketchy. The 44 team is the first team, and was led by R H Stone, and the Conchs played Lake Worth High in their very first game and lost 19-0. On that squad were: Harry "Bubba" Smelting, Charles Roche, Kenneth Meador, Jim Barker, Joe Alonso, Florencio Reyes, Adolph Lastres, Jimmy Register, Claude Valdez, Galey Sweeting, Joe Fleitas, Arthur Boza, Lee Griffin, Donald Lund, Zanzetti (1st name unknown). The 46 squad was led by Fred Hoffmeister. On that team were the following: Ed Head, Adolph Lastres, Claude Valdez, Galey Sweeting, Gilbert Valdez, Charles Perez, Kenneth Kerr, Oscar Cruz, Jack McCoy, Billy Albury, Robert Cruz, Curry Herring, Joe Fleitas, Al Cruz, Kenneth Meador, Harry Stonesipher, and Fred Miller the manager. Nathan Pepper took the helm in 48. Players on the team were: Lee Griffin, Eggie Kerr, Kenneth "Bo" Meador, Eugene "Bubba" Sweeting, Paul Higgenbotham, Claude Valdez, Adolph Lastres, Charles Ogden, Bobby Brown,

Tito Anguera, Joe Lewis, Ralph "Moe" Henriquez, John "Tinky" Knowles, O.B. Ingraham, John "Jingles" Solomon, Oscar Oropeza, Terry Doughtry, Raymond Gwinn, Charlie Wells and Alton Goehring

Coach Winston "Win" Jones took over the 49 squad. He led the Conchs to their very
First

District Title. The Conchs made it to the Quarter Finals, losing to Avon Park 5-2 in Class B.

On that squad were: Raymond Gywnn, John Solomon, Overton Ingraham, Ralph Henriquez, Terry Daughtry, Joe Lewis, Oscar Oropeza, Gerald Hernandez, Alton Goehring, George Cathey, Sam Roberts, John Knowles, James Sheppard, Jose Fernandez, and manager James Carey. They finished the season 7-1. 1 District Championship, 0 state titles.

1950'S:

The 50 team won the District Title, but we don't know how far they made it into the play-offs. There wasn't a team in 51.

The 52 team played a limited schedule and didn't meet the requirements of playing enough games to qualify for the state tournament.

The 53 Team under Coach Paul Davis, went 26-2 and won the very First State Title in the school's history. They defeated Tate 7-3 in the Class A. The Conchs went on to represent Florida in the Southeastern Regional High School Tournament, where they beat the State Champions from Alabama and Kentucky before losing to the State Champion from Georgia in the finals. The School District has a stadium built on Kennedy Dr. for both Football and Baseball.

In 54, with the nucleus of returning players from the First State Title in 53, the Conchs went 25-2, losing in the State Class 2A finals to St. Petersburg 9-5.

The 55 team won the Second State 2A Title with a 3-2 win over Andrew Jackson of Jacksonville, the Conchs finished the year with a 25-4 record. Paul Davis wins his

second Title. On that team were: Eloy Rodriguez, Julio Santana, Roger Bean, Paul Higgs, and a great left handed pitcher, Toney Hopey.

Coach Harold Allen took over the reins, and the 56 team went on to win another State Class 2A Championship as we had a repeat of the 55 game. Key West Defeats Andrew Jackson of Jacksonville 8-3. They finished the year with an 18-5 record. Toney Hopey struck out 18 batters in one game in the tournament to tie Herb Score for the tournament record. Julito Santana hit the first homerun it went out of Ft. Pierce's Jaycee Field in the State Tournament, then hit a Grand Slam against Lakeland. Members of this squad were: Sid "Mockingbird" Kerr, "Jungle Rat" Diaz, Stu Yates, Robbie Knowles, Everett Atwell, Danny Oropeza and Jimmy Mira.

In 57, the Conchs made it to the State Title game for the 3rd year in a row. Unfortunately they lost to Winter Park 2-1. They finished the season 18-4. Toney Hopey went 6-1, pitching in the State Tournament for 2 years.

The 58 & 59 teams were under a new Head Coach. Coach Jim Anderson took over and led the Conchs to Back to Back State Titles. Key West Defeated Avon Park 1-0 in the 58 A State Title game and beat Milton 3-2 for the 59 2A State Title. The Conchs won 52 games, going 23-3 in 58 and 19-7 in 59. George Mira was the main pitcher and John "Boog" Powell did the blasting of homeruns and hitting. Powell, Taylor and Garcia all had careers in the Majors, and Mira in the NFL, CFL, and WFL! Not bad for a school on a 4 mile long by 2 mile wide island. Team Members for those years were: George Mira, John "Boog" Powell, Bill Solomon, Carl Taylor, Mike Hughes, Mono Casas, Sam Holland, Bobby Pazo, Ritchie Garcia, Robert "Cuban" Santana, Ronnie Young, Richard Curry, Nib Rodriquez, Howie Barnwell, Jimmy Williams, Evelio "Pint" Estevez, and Eckie Solomon loses his life Serving our Country in the Vietnam War.

The Conchs made the State Final 4, 7 years in a row, winning 5 State Titles in the decade, a feat no other High School has ever matched!!!!!!!

8 District Championships, & 5 State Titles

1960's:

The 60 team led by George Mira went 15-5, and made the State Tournament, but were eliminated early. Mira lost his first game in the State Tournament in 3 years of pitching.

Pat Gallagher took over as the Head Coach from 61-64. The Conchs would win 63 games during that span losing only 11. They set a record with 19 wins in a row in 61 as they finished that season 20-1. The loss that season knocked them out of the State Tournament. Members of the early 60 teams were: John McCormick, Leslie Weech, Serge Sanchez (Pitchers), while Robert Santana, Carl Taylor, Charlie Powell and Danny McCormick were the top players.

The 65 & 66 teams were coached by Jim Pannell. The Conchs won 25 games in that time span. He would later be replaced by New coach, Otto Tufenkjian. On May 4, 1966 Key West played Mary Immaculate for the first time at Wickers field in front of 400 fans and lost 3-2 as ninth grader Randy Sterling Sr. pitched the victory for the

Mariners, he would later transfer to Key West High for the rest of his High School career.

67 Tufenkjian's team won 29 games his first 2 years. The stand out performers in the mid 60's were: Vic Albury, Lenny Carey, Damaso Santana, Henry Esquinaldo, Kenny Mesa, Chuck King, Pedro Fraga, Terry Stofer, Phillip Montero, Steve Thompson, and Ralph and Marty Arnold.

The 69 Key West Conchs hit the Jackpot. The Conchs made it back to the State Tournament and Coach Tufenkjian's team won the Class A Title defeating Lakeland Kathleen in their backyard in Lakeland! After that great victory, the Conchs then played Class AA Champion Hialeah in the playoff game for the Greater Miami Athletic Conference Title. The Conchs won the contest over the Thoroughbreds to lay claim to the Overall State Championship. (Shouldn't this be two instead of one?) The Conchs went 22-4, and Randy Sterling capped a spectacular high School career with an amazing 553 strike outs in 211 innings pitched. He was the 4th overall pick in the Major League Draft by the New York Mets. Key members of that squad: Battery mate Wayne "Goldie" Goldstein, Peter Valdez, Bill Spottswood, Kenny Wardlow, Clarence "Gully" Poitier, David Campo Cliff Lunn, Armando Quesada, and Dennis Bell.

2 District championships, & 1 State Title

1970's:

Mary Immaculate goes to the 71 State Tournament and loses in the Finals to Clearwater Central Catholic 1-0.

The Conchs went back to the State Tournament in 72. They reached the Finals of the State Tournament losing to Class AAA Champion St. Petersburg Bishop Berry 5-0. The final record was 18-8. In that same season, Mary Immaculate goes to the State Tournament and has a rematch and defeats Clearwater Central Catholic 12-4. Hard to believe that an island 4 miles long by 2 miles wide sent two teams to the FHSAA STATE TOURNAMENT!!!!!!!

The 74 squad lost in the Semi Finals of the State Tournament to Leesburg 2-1 in nine innings. Their final record was 16-11. Key Members of these teams were: Brooks Carey, Paulie Hammond, Ritchie Pazo, Victor Gallardo, Sid Poitier, Bobby Whyms, Steve Barrios, Ralph Henriquez Jr., Donald Brown, Louie Pazo, Kenny Allen, John Domenech, Bill Robinson, Bruce Tingley, and Eloy Rodriguez Jr. a member of the 74 team would lose his life Serving his Country as an Army Medic in Operation Desert Storm. Coach Tufenkjian gets fired.

The 75 team has a new Coach in Pedro Fraga, the first alumni to graduate and come back to be the Head Coach of his Alma Mater. March 22, 1975 John I. Leonard no hits Key West, but loses the game in 9 innings 1-0, also that season Key West plays Marathon High for the first meeting between the Keys schools. Key West wins 5-4 in 9 innings. Carlos Herrera pitches a Perfect game, 15 up, 15 down in a 10-0 rout of Pace on April 19. Key West plays Mary Immaculate for the second time in 77 at KWHS stadium in front of 300 fans, beating them 16-1. In that same season, they had three straight no-hitters pitched by Larry Davila, Mark Ingraham, and Davila again. The teams they no hit were Charlotte twice and Hallandale. In 1978 the Conchs played

Marathon for the second time and beat them 7-1 on April 22. On March 19, 1978 the Conchs defeat Mary Immaculate for the third time 16-3 at Wickers Stadium. The Conchs fielded good teams for the remainder of the 70's but failed to win a State Title. Players from the mid to end of the 70's were: Larry Davila, Frank Padron, Mark Ingraham, Richie Quesada, Tim Tucker, Ricky Warren, Derek Parker, Ricky Jones, Bard Capas, Benny Aleman, Keith and Kevin Butler, George Menendez, Mike Cooper, Steve Wells, Toney Roberts, and Robert "Speedy" Neal who was drafted in the NFL by the Buffalo Bills.

2 District Championships, & 0 State Titles

1980's:

In 80 & 81 the Conchs fielded competitive teams but couldn't get out of District Play. They beat Marathon for the third time in their tournament 5-0 on April 18, 1981. They were led by the Milliken Twins: Randy and Russ along with Chris Curry, Timmy Rodriguez, Randy Ealy, John Sellers, Gene Findley, and Bobby Schreiber.

The 82 team was within one game of making the State Final 4, losing in the Sectional Class 3A Championship to Palm Beach North Shore 6-4. They finished the season 19-9. They were District Champions led by: Joey Wardlow, George Lopez, Shecky Archer, Carl Allen, John Correll, Mike Henriquez Sr., Joe "Bubba" Santana, Kenny Rahming, Trond Welters, Donnie Catala, Raymond Revak and Reinaldo Rojas. Joey Wardlow goes 5-5 against Columbus and Key West played Coral Shores. The Hurricanes throw a 2 hitter at the Conchs but lose 5-1.

The 84 squad, won the District, Region, and Sectional Championships on their way to the States Final 4. Coach Fraga wins his Championship beating Melbourne Palm Bay 7-5 for the Schools 7th State Title in Class 3A. The Conchs finished the year 24-8. Todd Swofford of WKIZ 1500 am broadcasts the game back to Key West. The Conchs were led by Oneri David Fleita and Freddy Varela Jr., Key West got a huge surprise from pitcher Shaun Niles who was the pitching star in the State Tournament. Members of this team were: Joey Wardlow, Marc Lastres, Louie Blanco, Joey Diaz, Joey Gandolfo, Vince Bervaldi, Alvin Whyms, Alan Brickhouse, Al del Valle, Ricky Jaynes, Louie Gonzalez, and Donnie Elomina.

In 85, Left hander Al delValle earned a special place in KWHS Baseball Lore when he pitched a Perfect game 21 up and 21 down in beating Ft. Pierce Central 3-0. Ironically, his battery mate, catcher Louie Gonzalez and Al were born only hours apart on the same day at Monroe General Hospital.

86, 88, & 89 teams all win District Championships but don't advance to the State's Final 4. The streak of 18 consecutive winning seasons continue. Key players were: Scott Russell, Diego Caso, Kenny Hart, James Howard, Harold and Christian Milliken, John and Chris Hall, Alan Collins, Gary Moore, Kevin Cabanas, Ronnie Acevedo, Matt Alfonso, John Jackson, Billy Sawyer, Steve Pita, Harry Russell, Tad Cervantes, Andy Barrera, Ralph Sanchez, Juan Perez, Brian Merkey, Chris Valdez, and Kenny Wardlow Jr..

5 District Championships, & 1 State Title

1990's:

After 2 more winning seasons, but no championships, Coach Fraga retires after the 91 season, and was the Conchs longest tenured Head Coach for 17 seasons, (the Most of any coach at Key West High) and 274 wins, the 2nd most amongst Conch coaches in all sports.

In 92, KWHS GRAD Russ Milliken takes the reins of his Alma Mater. Doing a two year stint. Coach Milliken wins the District Title in 93 but loses a heart breaker in the Regional Championship 1-0. Coach Milliken moves and takes over the baseball program at Forest Hill High school in West Palm Beach. Members of these two squads were: Blane Barroso, Jonathan Jolly, JP Garcia, Jason Garcia, Chris Huffine, Jack Niles, Timmy Veliz, Mike Michaud, Sherman Hamlin, Willie Zerpa, Peter Fraga, Billy Parker, Billy Wardlow, Benny Lower, Alan Cruz, Jeff Hart, Mario Mira, Chris Zuelch, Tony Dipaolo, and Kevin Artigue.

94, KWHS GRAD and JV Head Coach, Ralph Henriquez Jr. takes the helm. On Jan. 11. Legendary Grounds keeper Rex Weech passes and will be forever missed! Coach Henriquez brings a new work ethic to the program like never before. Every situation broken down to the littlest detail is covered in practice. It pays off as Key West goes back to the State Tournament with a tremendous team that had pitching, hitting and defense. Key West wins the Districts. The Conchs set records with home attendance for the play-offs leading up to the States. The State goes to a different format with the first game after districts being a Sub Regional. The Conchs play South Broward and win 10-0. Next up is the Regional Finals where 4 teams play at the No. 1 seeded school, which is Key West. The Conchs take care of business cruising by Naples Lely 13-1, and the next night they crush Clearwater 9-2 in front of 1,800 screaming Conch fans. Key West is headed to the State's Final 4. Key West plays Clearwater in the Semi's and wins 9-2. Key West loses to Palmetto 7-6 in the Championship game before 2,000 loyal Conch fans. It is the third runner-up trophy for the program, and the team finishes 25-7. Players who were part of this team were: Martin and Randy Niles, Phil Dillmore, Timmy Parker, Darren Mills, Aaron Johnson Eric Balbuena, and Heath Brundage.

95, This turned out to be the season of seasons for the Conchs. The town was abuzz with excitement. Playing in front of an average of 1,000 fans at each home game, the Conchs were unbeatable. They win their District handily and crush South Broward 7-0 in the Sub Regional. In the Regional Semi's Key West defeats Estero 6-3, and the next night in front of 2,700 fans the Conchs crush Okeechobee 10-0 to head back to the State's final 4. Key West faces Nease in the Semi's and wins a nail biter 2-1. The Conchs go on to defeat Seminole Osceola 6-4 in front of more than 2,000 Conch fans and over 3,000 total for the game. This is the schools 8th State Championship. The final record was 35-2. Key West finished number 4 in the USA TODAY National Baseball Poll and end the season with a 27 game winning streak, that breaks the old record of 19 in 1961. Players were: Adrian Merkey, Paulie Walterson, Randy Sterling Jr.,

96, The season that was Bittersweet. It starts off with the Renaming of our field to Rex Weech Field, but the City of Key West, lost three Conchs with the passing of Fire Chief Dickie Wardlow and his Wife Nina, the Brother, Uncle and Aunt of baseball greats Kenny Sr., Joey, Kenny Jr., & Billy Jr., and Conch legend/Historian Glynn Archer Jr. who became ill at the Dole Tournament, and would later lose his battle against Cancer.

The media was abuzz with Key West. The Conchs make the Front page with a complete story in the USA TODAY SPORTS SECTION. How can a 4 x 2 mile Island produce so many great baseball players? ESPN Films does a show about the Conchs in March. They begin the year, the pre season Number 1 in the Country. A team that practiced 6 days a week, were very closely knit, and never complained. The fans poured into Rex Weech Field like never before to see their beloved Conchs play. Attendance at the games averaged over 1,500 fans. They continue their winning streak by winning the first 16 games of the season and ran it to 43 games before losing on a very controversial call to Bishop Moore 8-7. They travel to California to play in the Nationally acclaimed Dole Tournament. When they return, they head to Mark Light Stadium at the University of Miami to face the number 3 team in the Country, Westminster Christian. In front of 5,000 fans, both squads put on a great show as both teams battle against one another. With Key West leading 3-2, the Conchs give up a 3 run homer and lose 5-3. Key West remains Number 1 and Westminster moves up to Number 2. The Conchs continue their winning ways demolishing District opponents for the Championship, then crushing Hollywood Chaminade & Rockledge in the Regionals at the Rex. Rex Weech Field had people everywhere. Key West travels to Winter Haven and defeats them 7-0 for the Regional Championship. Key West heads back to the State's Final 4 for the 3rd time in a row. The FHSAA loves it when Key West makes a final 4 because they know our fans travel better than any other school in the state. More than 2,500 loyal Conch fans make the trip to Tampa. Key West doesn't disappoint with a Semi-final win demolishing South Lake 13-3 behind Craig Lariz's two homeruns. Key West goes on to get the School's 9th State Title, with an 11-6 victory over Bishop Kenny from Jacksonville. Paulie Walterson pitches the victory and Lariz hits another bomb to lead the way. They finish the year 32-5, Number 1 in the State of Florida, Number 2 Nationally. The first back to back State titles since the 58 and 59 seasons, plus back to back 30+ win seasons. A 2nd Title for Coach Henriquez.

A season dedicated to all Conch fans, supporters, and especially the Wardlows and Archers!

97, In a rebuilding year for the Conchs, hard work and dedication payed off as they finished with a winning season. They lose the District Championship. This meant they had to be on the road for the Play-offs. The Conchs travel to Tampa to play Tampa

Jesuit for the Regional Championship and a trip to the State Final 4. Key West loses to Jesuit who would win the State Title. The Conchs win 21 games that season. Conch baseball wins 123 (131, with preseason) games in the regular seasons and playoffs under Coach Henriquez. Coach steps down and moves on to take a Head Coaching position in the Atlanta Braves minor league system. Key Players were: Randy Sterling Jr., J.R. Mounts, Danny Schooley, Shane Curry, and Michael Balbuena.

98, For the 4th time in a row, a KWHS Grad takes over the program. Brooks Carey is named the new coach of the Conchs. Coach Carey brings in a completely different style of coaching. The Conchs respond well. Key West loses to Monsignor Pace in the District Championship. The Conchs rename themselves the "THE ROAD WARRIORS", as the Conchs had to travel for District play, Regional play, and State play. They went to Ft. Lauderdale, West Palm Beach, Sebring, Daytona Beach, and Tampa. In a strange series of events, the Conchs played The Spartans of Pace 5 times that season. Twice in the regular season, once in a tournament, Once for the District Championship game, then they both met for the State Title. The rivalry was intense between the two schools. Neither one liked each other. In the end, the Conchs came away with their 10th State Title in a thrilling contest defeating the Spartans at Legions Field in Tampa 4-3. The FHSAA changes the play-off system for the next season, it will no longer let two teams from the same District play for a State Title. Key West finishes the year 17-10. Coach Henriquez becomes the All-Time Winningest coach in Conch Baseball. Seniors: Antonio Knowles gets drafted in the 27th round by

The bats were hot and cold all season as consistency never happened. This schedule was by far one of the most difficult in the programs history. The Conchs dominated their District opponents and won the District Championship for the 3rd year in a row. Coach Henriquez's squad headed for the play-offs for the 15 straight time under his leadership. This team had as many as 4 Freshman start on the field, and never more than 3 Seniors, maturation was a major factor. By winning the District, the Conchs hosted the Regional Quarter Final. Losing the last two Quarter Finals at home haunted the Conchs. Rex Weech Field should be a demon for other teams. The Conchs play host to I-Mater Academy, a team who defeated them two years ago. In front of a jammed stadium, the combined pitching of Callan Carn and Dale Michaud, plus error-less defense and the timely two run rbi single by Preston Herce, the Conchs defeat the Lions 4-1. Long time rival and enemy the Monsignor Pace Spartans will be coming to Key West to play the Regional Semi Final. The Spartans defeated Key West in 2016 in a heart wrenching loss 2-1. Revenge is on the mind of this squad. When these two teams get together, throw away any records, it is a battle till the end. The "Rex" was filled to capacity and after two innings of play Key West was leading the Spartans 3-2. Pace makes a pitching change and the Conch bats go very silent. Key West was unable to score and the Spartans would go and score 3 times to win the contest 5-2 ending the season for Key West. Final Record of 13-15. With 7 starters returning, 2020 looks to be promising. 3 Conchs go on to play in college. 5 District Championships, 0 State Titles

2020, Having an established team, Coach Henriquez and the boys set the bar high, a District championship wouldn't be good enough, only the 12th State Championship will make this season a success. The boys have worked extremely hard since the end of last season. Dedication is what will make this year great. Coach Henriquez added a great addition to the program with a strength and conditioning Coach. Coach Burnett came to us from Panama City, after Hurricane Michael destroyed so much up there, Coach Burnett is a PE teacher at Key West High. He brings a wealth of knowledge about Strength, lifting and stretching. This took a load off the coaches and they can now concentrate on the other aspects of the game. The Conchs are returning 8 seniors, 5 of which are starters. Brendan Roney (Boston College), and Dane Black (Nova Southeastern Univ.) are four year returning starters, along with Mason Neller (Daytona St. College), Jordan Parks (Lynn Univ.), Josh Conn (Northeast Community College), Lazaro Valdez (Inspirational Academy), and Zack Albury (Daytona St. College). These men set the standards for practice and games, and the younger

players have learned about work ethic. A new play-off format by the FHSAA has been put in place, meaning, no longer does the top two teams in your District advance, only the District Champion is guaranteed a place in the State Play-offs. The Conchs realize that winning the District was the only way to assure themselves to be in the play-offs. The other four play-off teams are selected by a point system from all 4 Districts in the South Region 4. Coach Henriquez set a schedule up with difficult teams from all around the state. Rumors abound that weekend with Merritt Island may be the last for a while. The Conchs and Mustangs played a hard fought game that Friday March 13, and after the Conch victory, Superintendent Porter released a statement that schools were being CLOSED, and Distance/Virtual learning will take place. A worldwide virus called THE CORONAVIRUS, was spreading like wild fire. Saturday's game was cancelled, and the rest of the season was suddenly put on hold. Schools and all Athletic Facilities were shut down, no practices allowed, only on your own, a one week spring break turned into two weeks. Then the news came from the Superintendent that students will stay home to learn virtually, and teachers were getting a crash course about having to teach online. Everyone waited to see what was going to happen as the FHSAA would not cancel spring sports, they were hoping to reinstate them May 3 and go until June 30. Fans, Players, Coaches all awaiting the word, can we come back? Rex Weech Field sitting empty, No radio for the fans all over the world. Then Saturday April 18 turned Black, as the Governor of Florida had his press conference, and stated "all students will continue with Online classes as campuses will be closed for the remainder of the school year." The FHSAA followed suit with their announcement on Monday April 20 that the spring sports season is over. For our Conchs, especially our Seniors, the season came to an abrupt end. Final record 5-3. A year in which we will never know an outcome, but in our hearts, the Coaches and players won our 12th State Championship. We dedicate this season to Leroy (a lifelong fan) and Mrs. Webster (Statistician, and Team Mom) Who both passed away, and were intricate parts of our Conch Baseball Program. We will sorely miss them at our games, but they will be in our hearts forever!

21, *Coming into this season, Coach Henriquez had high expectations, but also a lot of worry. Covid had shut down 2020 after just 8 games. School was back in session with alternate days. The fall and winter sports teams were able to complete their seasons, would spring sports happen? Coach had a normal schedule set up with 25 games and 22 of them at home. Covid came back into play and the schedule would change numerous times. Teams were calling and telling Coach, their district will not let them travel. The Spring Break Tournament which was going to be in Key West had to be cancelled, and the team went back to Sanford to play in the Orlando Tournament. When the final schedule came out Key West would play a 24 game schedule but they would have 9 away trips which meant 12 games on the road. How strange a year*

when the first two months of the season, only 4 home games. Day games instead of night games. Coral Shores cancels two regular season games with the Conchs, and not due to Covid, and now the schedule is down to 22 games. The players had to police themselves and do the right thing to have a full season. Would they? Could they? With all this craziness, the Conchs didn't lose one game to Covid! The parents took their child to the games, and those that needed a ride Coach Burnett drove the bus with the players 6 feet apart, even Coach Henriquez drove himself to the games. The season began at Gulliver Prep where the Conchs lost on a walk off homerun. Doral was next and they weren't gracious hosts and the Conchs headed home for a 2 game series against Hialeah Champagnat. Champagnat swung the bats well and pitched to two victories over the Conchs. February couldn't come to an end quick enough. March came in like a lion, and the Conchs got a great extra inning win over Keys Gate in 9 innings. Losses to Killian, St. Brendan on a balk call and 2 to Coral Reef sent the Conchs reeling heading into the Sanford Tournament. Key West picked up two wins, with one of them being over the 8th ranked team in the Country, Spruce Creek. The Conchs then hit a skid again losing 5 in a row. Injuries were starting to mount up as our second baseman, centerfielder and right fielder were out. The Conchs finally got hot at the right time with big wins over Gulliver at their place again, and home against Westminster Christian, Coach called this rivalry week. With 2 more wins over Keys Gate to end the regular season, Key West was riding a 4 game win streak for the first time this year as they headed into the District Tournament. The Conchs were playing their best ball and their confidence level was rising. Could they turn the season around by winning Districts?? The District Tournament was held at Miami Springs, and the Conchs were the number 3 seed and they would be playing the host school, Miami Springs Golden Hawks. The FHSAA went back to the old format which meant all Key West needs to do is make it into the District Championship game to move on. With everything on the line the Conchs handed the ball to Senior Michael Alfonso. Key West quickly fell behind 3-0 but battled back to take a 7-5 lead heading into the bottom of the fifth. After two outs, the Golden Hawks scored 5 runs and the Conchs just couldn't come back and lose 10-7. The final record for this season ended at 7-16. There is an old saying: "All streaks come to an end." After 16 straight years, Coach Henriquez has led his team into the State-Play-offs, that streak came to an end. Landon Lowe will go on to play at Indian River State College, and Logan Pellicier will play at Polk Community College, Jayden Burchfield at Kaiser University. We say good bye to Nate Barroso, and Daniel Varela. Michael Alfonso gets drafted by the Texas Rangers in the 17th round, and former Conch Antonio Knowles gets drafted in round 13 by the LA Dodgers.

22, Having to be on the road for most of last season, Coach has a schedule with 24 home games and 3 on the road. The spring break tournament will be in Key West. Killian will host the District Tournament. Coach Henriquez is now the longest tenured Head Coach in the program's history. The pre-season games with Taravella were split and now it is on to the regular season. The conchs sweep the opening weekend of the regular season against University School. Gabe Williams hits the first homerun of the year, and Jacob Burnham is masterful on the mound. Trevor Zuelch scores 4 runs in a

game, and Preston Herce hits a grand slam to lead the conchs to a victory behind Burnham and Talkovich. On Saturday, another come from behind victory to keep Key West undefeated, and a sweep of Barron Collier.

Merritt Island comes to town and takes two from the Conchs. Key West now will play 6 games in 8 days. The Conchs sweep Bishop Verot, and defeat St. Thomas Aquinas in Alex Rodriguez Park at Mark Light Stadium, the University of Miami. The 1st Key West Spring Break Tournament was held with Westminster Christian, North Fort Myers, and John Carroll Catholic along with the Conchs. Key West goes 1-2 in the tournament. Key West has a very good week with wins over Academy at the lakes and Coral Shores, highlighted by Lucky Barroso's no hitter. West Broward came to town and took two from the Conchs, but they rebounded by beating Marathon and winning the county championship. The Conchs keep the winning streak going with sweeps of Rockledge and Keys Gate. Next up is the White Whale for Coach, Columbus. Behind the two hit pitching of Lucky Barroso and the homerun of Trevor Zuelch, the Conchs harpoon Moby Dick, and Coach Henriquez and the boys beats Columbus 3-0, and with a sweep of Killian the Conchs go into the District play-offs as the number 1 seed. Key West wins District championship 31 with wins over Sunset (Jacob Burnham throws a no hitter) and a dramatic come from behind extra inning game with St. Brendan 7-6. Now the State play-offs begin. Behind the pitching of Lucky Barroso and the hitting of Trevor Zuelch, the Conchs roll the Tritons of Mariner High 7-0 in the ¼ Regionals at the Rex in front of 1,000 screaming conchs all in red. The Semi Regionals were held at the Rex in front of 1,200 fans in a Red Out. The place was electrified and it turned out to be a fantastic game, but for Key West the season came to a close with a heartbreaking 4-2 loss to Miami Springs. The season ends at 22-7, what a great turnaround from last year. For our 5 seniors: Jason Yarborough, Billy Kight, Kai Smith (Columbia International College), Trevor Zuelch (Hope College), and Preston Herce (Pensacola State College), It was magical with Preston Herce flirting with a .500 avg. for most of the season and ended at .494, and Tevor Zuelch hitting .400. Lucky Barroso ended the season with a 0.76 era second only to the great Randy Sterling Sr. The entire pitching staff returns for next season, plus 5 starters in the field, next season could be the one!

23, Heading into this season, the conchs are stacked on the mound. Lead by Lucky Barroso, Jacob Burnham, and Felix Ong, Coach Henriquez is very confident that these young men will get the job done. He knows he has to replace three 3 infielders from last season, and two tremendous bats that are playing at the next level. Coach feels this could be the year the conchs return to the State Final 4. The conchs led by Jack Haggard at the plate are playing great baseball. They had a special addition to the team as Mike Greenberg joined the squad and has sparked the conchs in emotions we haven't seen in a long time. Lucky Barroso has been the dominant pitcher for Key West. The biggest game of the regular season was against the No. 1 team in the State of Florida and No. 2 in the National Rankings Stoneman Douglas. Stoneman Douglas proved why they are the best team in the State as they beat the conchs at Douglas. Key West came back and won the final three games of the regular season to finish

18-5. The Conchs are the number 1 seed in District play and in the Semi-Finals they beat Killian 3-1 behind the pitching of Lucky Barroso. They will now face Miami Sunset in the finals.

Key West wins it's 32 District Championship by beating Miami Sunset. Behind the one hit pitching of Felix Ong, and the Homerun power supplied by Anden Rady and his 6 RBI's the conchs demolish Miami Sunset for Back to Back District Championships and this is number 32. The conchs are the Number 1 seed in Regional play which means the road to the State's Final Four runs through Key West. Coach Henriquez asks the fans to wear their conch white for the WHITE OUT. The Conchs faced Somerset Academy out of Ft. Lauderdale in the ¼ Regionals. Noah Burnham and Mikey Greenberg lead the conchs to an 8-5 victory in front of 1,000 screaming fans. Next up is the Regional Semi's against Miami Springs, the team who has knocked the Conchs out the last two seasons. The WHITE OUT continues in the Regional Semi's. A packed house of more than 1,200 fans screaming and cheering the Conchs. We get the monkey off our back as Anthony Lariz hits a grand slam to propel the Conchs to the victory over the Golden Hawks 7-2. In the Regional Championship, the conchs face the Knights. The WHITE OUT continues. Over 1,500 fans pack the Rex. Lucky Barroso gets the call to the mound. The game is intense and close and Key West takes a 1-0 lead heading into the top of the 6th inning. Sunset changes strategy and starts swinging at the first pitch. They mount a rally and score two runs and take the lead. The starting pitcher for the Knights gets the first out and then is lifted for their closer. He strikes out the first conch, then hits the next. Mikey Greenberg is up and hits a hotshot which looks like it is going up the middle. Their second baseman makes a great play to get the ball and flip it to the shortstop at second for the third out and Sunset upsets Key West 2-1. The Rex becomes silent, but what a game, and then the fans show their appreciation with cheering for what the Conchs have done!! The Conchs finish the year at 22-6. For the seniors; Jack Haggard .436 avg. (Quincy), Lucky Barroso (Indian River), Marlin Takovich (F.I.U.), Anden Rady 2 Hr's. (La Grange), and Wyatt Khun (Dyersburgh), we thank you for all the great memories. It's on to next season with a team that will be ready and willing to go after another possible State Championship.

24, The Conchs will be playing on a new outfield as the School District put in phase one of the stadium upgrade. The football side is complete and the new outfield grass is laid. Rick and Judd, and the stadium announcing crew have a new press box to announce the games, the scoreboard was moved down to the left field line, and the flag pole was moved to behind the left field fence. Coach Henriquez adds former major league star Doug Mientkiewicz to the staff. The preseason gets underway with a packed house watching Key West and Taravella play to a 3-3 tie. On Saturday Key West gets crushed by Taravella 10-0. Opening Weekend saw the Conchs play and sweep North Fort Myers 5-0, and 7-2. In a thrilling 10 inning contest, the Conchs squeeze by University School 4-3, as the Freshman lead the way with 8 hits of the 12 Key West had. Against Spanish River, the Conchs left 12 men on base and couldn't come up with a clutch hit in their first loss of the season, 5-3. The second game with

Spanish River was played with extremely heavy hearts as Key West High loses a son. Conch Great Dexter Butler who played Baseball and has the highest batting avg. for a career, passed. Dexter was a teacher and the Head Basketball coach for the Conchs. With a stadium filled to capacity, Anthony Lariz pitches the best game of his career going the distance, 7 Innings, and 10 K's later, Key West wins 3-2. This ones for you Coach Dexter Butler, surely missed, never forgotten!!!! Fort Pierce's John Carroll comes in for a two game set and takes game one 4-1.

They make 5 great defensive plays and come up with great pitching and timely hitting to defeat the Conchs. In game two, Anthony Lariz continues his torrid pitching pace from last week tossing a complete game 2 hitter with 9K's to lead the Conchs to a 2-0 win. The Conchs were their worst enemy with 3 errors and 2 wild pitches in a loss to American Heritage Plantation losing 3-1. Belen came to town for the first time since 2010. A very controversial call in the fifth inning changed the momentum of the game. Nelson Ong makes a great throw to home from rightfield and Noah Burnham applies the tag on the runner. Is he out? Safe? First call was out, then the umpire cancels the call asks the infield umpire for his thoughts, and the runner gets called safe. The wheels came off the bus and Belen wins 7-1. Its off to California to play three games in the Anaheim Lions Tournament. Game one was the best game the Conchs played. Anthony Lariz was efficient going 8 innings and strkiking out 11. Key West could only muster one run, and in the bottom of the tenth, Sonora scores the winning run beating the Conchs 2-1. Playing on one of the nicest fields ever Aliso Niguel beats the Conchs 11-6. Key West out hits them but poor pitching did them in. The final game was against San Clemente. Jacob Burnham throws four great innings, but the ump squeezes the zone and Jacob ends up giving up 5 runs in the fifth and 4 in the seventh and lose 9-2. It was a great trip, but some work needs to be done to get ready for the month of April, and the big tournament in North Carolina. Anthony Lariz has another stellar performance pitching 6 innings with 13'k and no runs allowed leading Key West to a 5-0 win over ABF Homestead. Jacob Burnham goes the distance in shutting out ABF Hialeah 4-0. Back to back shutouts to get back to .500. The Conchs traveled to Columbus for their yearly contest with the Explorers. Key West just couldn't put it together and could only manage one hit. The pitching wasn't there and Columbus wins Mientkiewicz leads the way with 3 hits as the Conchs crush the sailors 10-0. What a difference twenty four hours make as Key West was unable to hold a 1-0 lead, and the bullpen fails as the Conchs lose 4-1 to the sailors. It is off to the USA National High School Baseball Invitational for four games in four days. Key West goes 2-2 in Carey, North Carolina. They lose to Harvard Westlake 10-2, the next day Wesleyan Christian wins 9-2. Day three Jacob Burnham pitches his third straight complete game, and Steel Mientkiewicz hits the game winning single that scores Nelson Ong as Key West wins 4-3. Day four sees a combined effort from Christian Koppal, and Kasey Kasper as the Conchs hold off a pesky Chapparral school from Arizona winning 9-5. The Conchs traveled to F.I.U. to play the second best team in the state, Westminster Christian. These two teams have the most State Titles each with 11. The game was tight and intense as Key West held a 3-2 lead in the bottom of the fifth. The Conchs make a pitching change and instead of it being a

position for position change, the warriors challenge the move and the umpires after a 15 minute delay makes Key West remove our starting pitcher from the field of play. With two outs and runners on first and second for the warriors, they hit a shallow fly ball to left field. Both our short stop and left fielder are going after the ball. The left fielder calls off the short stop but was he going to run in to him, did he take his eye off the ball just for a second, the ball seems to hit off him and ricochets way off towards the left field line and they score two runs to take 4-3 lead. The Warriors would hold off Key West and win a tight one 6-4. Key West rebounds with a nice win over South Dade 4-1. Key West host Eustis for the final two games of the regular season and split with them winning Friday night 3-0, and losing Saturday night 5-1. The regular season ends with a record of 12-13.

District Play begins, and the Conchs hold on for an exciting 2-1 victory over St. Brendan. Anthony Lariz pitches the complete game with 8 K's to lead the Conchs to the win in the Semi's. Completing the book end performance on the mound, Jacob Burnham pitches 6 2/3 innings for the win with Felix Ong getting the save to lead the Conchs to a 2-0 win over Killian for the 33rd District Championship, and Coach Henriquez's 13th District Title as the Head Coach. Roman Garcia had a big hit in each game to drive in the extra run the Conchs needed.

In the 1/4 Regional game. Key West host Jensen Beach and the Rex is full to capacity with a Red Out. The contest is crazy with great catches and big plays. Key West trail by 3 runs heading into the bottom of the seventh. The Conchs score three to tie and sent the game into extra innings. After a one-two-three in the top of the eighth, Key West loads the bases up and with two outs Caden Pichardo gets hit with a pitch and the Conchs come away with a thrilling come from behind walk off win 5-4. The Rex erupts like a volcano!!!! The Conchs roll into the Semi's with a chip on their shoulder as a bad comment was made about the team and our community by the Cardinal Gibbons Head Coach. The city was outraged and they showed up to the Chiefs field ready to battle. The game was a heated contest and Caden Pichardo and Roman Garcia hit bombs to give Key West a 3-2 lead. Gibbons scored 4 runs in the bottom of the 6th to go up 6-2. The Conchs never die attitude prove to be true as Key West fought back with 5 runs to take the lead heading into the bottom of the seventh 7-6. Gibbons gets three hits, two of which were bunt singles to load the bases and then on the next pitch the umpire calls a balk, game tied. Coach makes a pitching change and a wild pitch occurs Gibbons scores the winning run and the season comes to a abrupt end losing 8-7. Final record is 15-13. We say goodbye to Seniors Jacob Burnham (Boston College) (21 career wins), Anthony Lariz (UCF), Felix Ong (UF), Hunter White (Inspirational Academy), and Steel Mientkiewicz (Georgia Highlands) & Julian Brown. Thanks for the memories.
